# Legislation and Matters Arising

### **Emerging Legislation**

Government Bills

- <u>Clean Air (Human Rights) Bill 2019-20</u>: amongst other things the Bill establishes the
  right to breathe clean air; requires the Secretary of State to achieve and maintain clean
  air in England and Wales; and to enhance the powers, duties and functions of the
  Environment Agency, the Committee on Climate Change, local authorities (including
  port authorities), the Civil Aviation Authority, Highways England, Historic England and
  Natural England in relation to air pollution. The Second Reading is still yet to be
  scheduled.
- Environment Bill 2019-21: amongst other things the Bill aims to make provision about targets, plans and policies for improving the natural environment, for statements and reports about environmental protection, conservation covenants, and about air quality. The Government have reintroduced the Bill and have said that it demonstrates a 'commitment to tackling climate change and to protecting and restoring our natural environment for future generations'. The Bill received its sixteenth to twentieth sessions in a Public Bill Committee. The Public Bill Committee voted against the proposed amendment to include heritage in the Environment Bill, noting there was recognition of the connection between the natural environment and heritage in the 25-Year Environment Plan. The date for the report stage and third reading at the House of Commons is to be confirmed.

### **Matters Arising**

Private Members' Bills

- <u>Climate and Ecology Bill 2019-21.</u> The Bill requires the Prime Minister to achieve climate and ecology objectives; to give the Secretary of State a duty to create and implement those objectives; to establish a Citizens' Assembly; and to give duties to the Committee on Climate Change regarding the objectives and strategy. The Bill was presented to Parliament on 2 September. Its Second Reading is scheduled to take place on 12 March 2021.
- <u>Desecration of War Memorials Bill 2019-21</u>. The Bill aims to create the offence of desecrating a war memorial. It was introduced to Parliament on 23 June under the *Ten Minute Rule*. Its Second Reading in the House of Commons is scheduled to take place on 5 February 2021.
- Planning (Proper Maintenance of Land) Bill 2019 21. The Bill makes provision for increased fines for failures to comply with a notice under section 215 of the Town and Country Planning Act 1990. Jonathan Gullis MP made positive reference to historic buildings and Historic England. It was introduced to Parliament under the Ten Minute Rule. Its Second Reading is scheduled for 5 February 2021.

#### Private Bills

 Highgate Cemetery Bill: The Bill needed a 'Wharncliff' Examination to comply with certain standing orders concerning the consents of owners, members and directors of companies. The Bill was found compliant on 9 March. The bill now proceeds to an Opposed Bill Committee to consider the petitions. A date has not been set.

#### **Heritage Planning Case Database**

Historic England tweets planning decisions of heritage interest, via <u>@HeritageAdvice</u>, and these are then collated into the <u>Heritage Planning Case Database</u>. This is a searchable online database of appeal and call-in decisions relating to planning permission (that affects a heritage asset) and listed building consent. Cases have been summarised using a <u>standard list of search terms</u>, for ease of use; searches can also be carried out by address, date or decision reference.

### **Committees**

### Housing, Communities and Local Government (HCLG) Committee

• The House of Commons Housing, Communities and Local Government Committee is proceeding with the <u>inquiry on the future of the planning system in England.</u> Minister for Housing Christopher Pincher and Simon Gallagher, Director of Planning at MHCLG appeared before the Select Committee on 7 December. A transcript of the hearing can be found <u>here.</u> References made to the historic environment were in relation to conservation, preservation and managing change, and protected areas having appropriate rules in place; with heritage considerations handled earlier in the planmaking process.

# **MHCLG Letter to Chief Planning Officers**

Historic England Advice

# **Training**

Historic England Training

 In response to Covid-19 restrictions, Historic England is increasing its e-learning and remote CPD provision.

### Other Initiatives

Standard Methodology for Housing Need

- Following the 'Changes to the Current Planning System' September consultation, the Government announced an updated formula for its standard methodology for housing need, with the aim to increase housing delivery in England's 20 largest cities and towns. Full details of the new standard method formula will be published shortly.
- The Government response to the standard methodology proposals in the September consultation can be found here.

APPG - Conservation, Places and People

 An All Party Parliamentary Group on Conservation, Places and People launched an <u>inquiry</u> on 21<sup>st</sup> Century Places: values and benefits. It will examine the value of the historic environment and how it can help to promote growth and regeneration. The call for evidence closes on 29 January 2021.

Planning Reform – Design Body Steering Group

• A <u>Steering Group</u> has been convened to explore the options for establishing a new expert design body which can help authorities make effective use of design guidance and codes, monitoring their application. The Steering Group is chaired by Nicholas Boys Smith and members include sector leaders, acting in a personal capacity.

Urban Centre Recovery Taskforce

 Government announced a new <u>Urban Centre Recovery Taskforce</u> on 16 December to examine how housing, planning and regeneration can help cities recover from the economic impact of Covid-19.

### **Current Consultations**

- On 3 December MHCLG launched a <u>consultation</u> on 'Supporting Housing Delivery and Public Service Infrastructure' which proposes new and amended Permitted Development (PD) Rights and other changes to the planning system. The proposed changes, subject to consultation, are:
  - A new PD right to allow all buildings within Use Class E to be converted to residential use (Use Class C3) without requiring a planning application.

- A new 'fast track' planning route to build public service buildings with a determination period of 10 weeks and a statutory consultation period of 14 days.
- Revision to existing PD right to allow greater extension of public service buildings.
- The closing date for the consultation is 28 January 2021.
